The initial promise of agrarian reforms was to distribute land to the landless and provide title of ownership to the cultivators. However, unfortunately, India's agrarian reforms did not ensure egalitarianism in the agricultural community, says the Dalwai Committee Report asking for agriculture policies to factor in this aspect while crafting policies to double farmers' income by 2022, as promised by Government. This raises a pertinent issue that has policy ramifications. For instance, before 40 years, Green Revolution in 1960s focused on increasing productivity and yield.
