- Transboundary Manas Conservation Area wins the <u>TX2 Conservation Excellence Award for</u> <u>2020</u>.
- » Details of the TTCA
 - The Awards celebrate the <u>10 year anniversary of all 13 Tiger Range countries</u> committing to double the global population of wild tigers by 2022 a goal called TX2.
 - It is given in two categories
 - TX2 Conservation Excellence Award
 - The award recognizes a site that has achieved excellence in two or more of five themes:
 - Tiger and prey population monitoring and research (tiger translocation/prey augmentation);
 - Effective site management;
 - Enhanced law enforcement, protection and ranger welfare improvement;
 - Community-based conservation, benefits and human-wildlife conflict mitigation and;
 - Habitat and prey management.
 - **TX2 Award** It is given for <u>efforts to increase tiger population</u> and includes a <u>financial</u> grant to assist the ongoing conservation efforts.
 - About TraMCA (Transboundary Manas Conservation Area)
 - It comprises of <u>500 sq kms</u> of Manas National Park in Assam and <u>1057 sq kms</u> of <u>Royal Manas</u> <u>National Park in Bhutan</u>. Manas river flow through both these area and makes both parks an important watershed area.
 - The number of Tigers in the India Manasa increased from 9 in 2010 to 25 in 2018.
 - The number of Tigers in the Bhutan Manasa increased from <u>12 in 2008 to 26 in 2018</u>.
- » **Pilibhit Tiger Reserve** also won the TX2 award for <u>doubling its Tiger population</u>.
 - It has recorded <u>65 tigers</u> in 2018 census

D) NATIONAL TIGER CONSERVATION EFFORTS: PROJECT TIGER

- It is a tiger conservation programme launched in 1973 by the Government of India.
- Objectives / Aims
 - » <u>Ensuring a viable **population**</u> of Bengal Tigers in their natural habitats and also to protect them from extinction.
 - » Preserving areas of biological importance as a national heritage for the benefit education and enjoyment of people.
 - » Harmonizing the rights of tribal people living in and around tiger reserves.

Tiger Reserves

- Tiger reserves are the areas that are notified for the protection of the tiger and its prey, and are governed by Project Tiger and administered by the National Tiger Conservation <u>Authority</u>.
- Tiger reserves are constituted on a **core/buffer strategy**:
 - The Core Area have the legal status of a national park or a sanctuary with an exclusive tiger agenda.
 - These areas are <u>required to be kept inviolate</u> for the purposes of tiger conservation, without affecting the rights of Scheduled Tribes or such <u>other forest dweller</u>s.
 - The Buffer or peripheral areas are a mix of forest and non-forest land, managed as a multiple use area with an inclusive people-oriented agenda.
