Why in News?

The Ministry of Environment, Forests and Climate Change has notified the Plastic Waste Management Amendment Rules, 2021.

About

- Plastic Waste Management Amendment Rules, 2021 amend the 2016 rules.
- The manufacture, import, stocking, distribution, sale and use of the identified <u>single-use plastic</u> will be <u>prohibited</u> with <u>effect from the 1st July, 2022</u>.
- The ban will not apply to commodities made of compostable plastic.
- For banning other plastic commodities in the future, other than those that have been listed in this notification, the government has **given industry ten years** from the date of notification **for compliance**.
- The permitted thickness of the plastic bags, <u>currently 50 microns</u>, will be <u>increased to 75 microns</u> from 30th September, 2021, and <u>to 120 microns</u> from the 31st December, 2022.
- Plastic bags with higher thickness are <u>more easily handled</u> as waste and have <u>higher recyclability</u>.
- Legal Framework for Banning Plastic → Currently, the Plastic Waste Management Rules, 2016, <u>prohibits</u> manufacture, import, stocking, distribution, sale and use of carry bags and plastic sheets <u>less than 50 microns in thickness</u> in the country.
- Implementing Agency The <u>Central Pollution Control Board</u>, along with <u>state pollution bodies</u>, will monitor the ban, identify violations, and impose penalties already prescribed under the <u>Environmental Protection Act</u>, <u>1986</u>.

Compostable Plastics:

- Instead of using plastic made from petrochemicals and fossil fuels, compostable plastics are derived <u>from renewable</u> <u>materials</u> like <u>corn</u>, <u>potato</u>, and <u>tapioca starches</u>, <u>cellulose</u>, <u>soy protein</u>, and <u>lactic acid</u>.
- These are <u>non-toxic</u> and <u>decompose</u> back into carbon dioxide, water, and biomass when composted.

13. Greater Adjutant Storks (Garuda)

Why in News?

In a first, Bihar has decided to tag greater adjutant storks (Leptoptilos dubius) with GPS trackers to monitor their movement as a part of efforts to conserve them.

About

- Scientific Name → <u>Leptoptilos dubius</u>.
- Habitat →
 - Once found across <u>South and Southeast Asia</u>, the Greater Adjutant is one of the most threatened stork species in the world.
 - There are only three known breeding grounds one in Cambodia and two in India (Assam and Bihar).
- Protection Status →
 - o IUCN Red List: Endangered
 - Wildlife (Protection) Act 1972: <u>Schedule IV</u>.
- The English name of the <u>stork</u>, which has a <u>large wedge-shaped bill</u> and a <u>prominent neck pouch</u>, is derived from its <u>stiff soldier-like gait</u>.
- Significance →
 - Religious Icon → They are considered the mount of Vishnu, one of Hinduism's prime deities.
 - Helpful for Farmers → They help farmers by <u>killing rats and other farm pests</u>.
- Threat → The estimated Global Population of Greater Adjutant Storks (around 800-1,200) has <u>fallen</u> over the years largely <u>due to the ingestion of plastic</u>.
